 - We do not hold comprehensive and up to date information on this, as patients tend to vary their titles over time, and there is no requirement for them to formally notify us of this. The Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) only applies to recorded information that exists within the public authority at the time of the request.

FOIA does not require an authority to answer questions where this would involve the creation of new information, and this question can only be answered by writing out to tens of thousands of patients, both current and past, to obtain new data on their current preferred nomenclature, which, as explained above is beyond the scope and provision of resources of the FOIA.
