Waiting Times for Primary and Secondary Care Mental Health Services

(Prepared in response to FOI Request Ref:16-17048 on 8th June 2016)

NB: Our response is set out in this report, by Adults service – of which we have 4, so each question has been answered four times, each one being in the order of your request.

Our Services are all highly specialist outpatient mental health services. TAP and PCPS are based within doctors' surgeries in Hackney and Camden, and the Adult Complex Needs and Portman Clinic are both clinic-based services, receiving referrals predominately from Greater London, but also from the whole of the UK.



Team Around the Practice – TAP TAP is a primary care psychotherapy service.

- 1. The current waiting time for treatment from referral for talking therapies in Team Around the Practice is five months
- 2. The longest wait is five months, this is based on a number of factors including:
 - situations where patients have chosen to wait to be seen in their own surgery rather than receive a treatment more quickly in another setting,
 - Waiting times vary according to demand and can change.

Priority will always be given according to clinical need (for example where there is greater risk or the opportunity to engage may be limited by situational factors) over and above place on a waiting list.

We communicate regularly with waiting patients to keep them informed of waiting times and to offer the opportunity and possibility of a further review meeting if this is requested or a patient needs to be in touch whilst waiting.
